This annual event raises money for vital pieces of medical equipment for the IWK Health Centre. Over its lifetime, it has raised over \$8 million dollars for the children's hospital.

Building Houses for the Vulnerable –

Some of rcs's proudest projects in the community includes work on safe spaces for vulnerable and struggling community members. rcs is always proud to see their name and signs attached to great projects, but they are even prouder to see it attached to great causes that support our communities.

- Sobeys Cancer Support Centre —
 The expansion and renovation to the
 Sobeys Cancer Support Centre that
 lodges welcome homes away from
 home for people with cancer who need
 to travel to receive treatment.
- Hospice Halifax The construction of a second-hand store for Hospice Halifax to provide a way to raise funds for the ongoing operation and programs.
- Bryony House The construction of the Bryony Multi-Story Facility completed in 2020. Bryony House is a 24-bed shelter and each year, approximately 470 women and children stay there and 2,500 distress calls are answered intended to break the cycle of abuse.

Supporting Diversity & Inclusion

Members of the rcs leadership team are active with many community groups to connect with and recruit immigrants, those identifying as female, and other underrepresented communities to be a part of rcs's talented team.

Working with these community partners allows rcs the incredible opportunity to

involve a diverse set of people, skills and backgrounds.

- Mental Health Foundation of Nova Scotia, a registered charity that works to increase financial support to community initiatives throughout Nova Scotia while providing hope and eradicating the stigma around mental illness and addiction
- Techsploration, a program aimed at empowering female-identifying students in ninth grade and encouraging them to consider careers in science, trades, engineering and technology.
- Immigrant Services Association of Nova Scotia (ISANS), an organization that helps immigrants build a future in Nova Scotia, through integration services in settlement, employment, language, business, and community connections.
- YWCA Halifax's Shift Change program, a project that began in 2018 with a question of how to further women's economic security in the field of skilled trades.
- reachAbility, an organization providing supportive and accessible programs that build capacity for inclusion and equalize the playing field for people facing barriers.

Advocates for Industry

rcs construction has been a proud member the Construction Association of Nova Scotia for twenty-five years. rcs and CANS has shared a long history of working together to better the industry. This year, Brendan Nobes, a member of the rcs leadership team, was elected as first vice-chair of the Canadian Construction Association's Board of Directors. Brendan is hardworking, dedicated and passionate about the construction industry and the community that his company builds in.

Throughout his involvement with the Construction Association of Nova Scotia, Brendan was (and still is) influential in moving the industry forward — he was a huge asset in guiding CANS through Standard Practices, a key industry supporter in the development and execution of the CANS Online Bidding System, and instrumental in shaping other areas of our programs and services. Brendan's appointment is the first time a Nova Scotian has held this position since 1989 when Jack Flemming of Ocean. Contractors held the honour.
